SUPPLEMENT to PERMIT No. 193-01 Cheboygan County Humane Society Cheboygan, Michigan

November 14, 2001

GENERAL CONDITIONS

- 1. The process or process equipment covered by this permit shall not be reconstructed, relocated, altered, or modified, unless a Permit to Install authorizing such action is issued by the Department, except to the extent such action is exempt from the Permit to Install requirements by any applicable rule. [R 336.1201(1)]
- 2. If the installation, reconstruction, relocation, or alteration of the equipment for which this permit has been approved has not commenced within 18 months, or has been interrupted for 18 months, this permit shall become void unless otherwise authorized by the Department. Furthermore, the person to whom this permit was issued, or the designated authorized agent, shall notify the Department via the Supervisor, Permit Section, Air Quality Division, Michigan Department of Environmental Quality, P.O. Box 30260, Lansing, Michigan 48909, if it is decided not to pursue the installation, reconstruction, relocation, or alteration of the equipment allowed by this Permit to Install. [R 336.1201(4)]
- 3. If this Permit to Install is issued for a process or process equipment located at a stationary source that is not subject to the Renewable Operating Permit program requirements pursuant to R 336.1210, operation of the process or process equipment is allowed by this permit if the equipment performs in accordance with the terms and conditions of this Permit to Install. [R 336.1201(6)(b)]
- 4. The Department may, after notice and opportunity for a hearing, revoke this Permit to Install if evidence indicates the process or process equipment is not performing in accordance with the terms and conditions of this permit or is violating the Department's rules or the Clean Air Act. [R 336.1201(8), Section 5510 of Act 451, P.A. 1994]
- 5. The terms and conditions of this Permit to Install shall apply to any person or legal entity that now or hereafter owns or operates the process or process equipment at the location authorized by this Permit to Install. If the new owner or operator submits a written request to the Department pursuant to R 336.1219 and the Department approves the request, this permit will be amended to reflect the change of ownership or operational control. The request must include all of the information required by subrules (1)(a), (b) and (c) of R 336.1219. The written request shall be sent to the District Supervisor, Air Quality Division, Michigan Department of Environmental Quality. [R 336.1219]
- 6. Operation of this equipment shall not result in the emission of an air contaminant which causes injurious effects to human health or safety, animal life, plant life of significant economic value, or property, or which causes unreasonable interference with the comfortable enjoyment of life and property. [R 336.1901]
- 7. The owner or operator of a source, process, or process equipment shall provide notice of an abnormal condition, start-up, shutdown, or malfunction that results in emissions of a hazardous or toxic air pollutant in excess of standards for more than one hour, or of any air contaminant in excess of standards for more than two hours, as required in this rule, to the District Supervisor, Air Quality Division. The notice shall be provided not later than two business days after start-up,

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shutdown, or discovery of the abnormal condition or malfunction. Written reports, if required, must be filed with the District Supervisor within 10 days, with the information required in this rule. [R 336.1912]

- 8. Approval of this permit does not exempt the person to whom this permit was issued from complying with any future applicable requirements which may be promulgated under Part 55 of Act 451, P.A. 1994 of the Clean Air Act.
- 9. Approval of this permit does not obviate the necessity of obtaining such permits or approvals from other units of government as required by law.
- 10. Operation of this equipment may be subject to other requirements of Part 55 of Act 451, P.A. 1994, and the rules promulgated thereunder.
- 11. Except as provided in subrules (2) and (3) or unless the special conditions of the Permit to Install include an alternate opacity limit established pursuant to subrule (4) of R 336.1301, a person shall not cause or permit to be discharged into the outer air from a process or process equipment a visible emission of density greater than the most stringent of the following. The grading of visible emissions shall be determined in accordance with R 336.1303. [R 336.1301]
 - a) A six-minute average of 20% opacity, except for one 6-minute average per hour of not more than 27% opacity.
 - b) A visible emission limit specified by an applicable federal new source performance standard.
 - c) A visible emission limit specified as a condition of this permit to install.
- 12. Collected air contaminants shall be removed as necessary to maintain the equipment at the required operating efficiency. The collection and disposal of air contaminants shall be performed in a manner so as to minimize the introduction of contaminants to the outer air. Transport of collected air contaminants in Priority I and II areas requires the use of material handling methods specified in R 336.1370(2). [R 336.1370]
- 13. Except as allowed by Rule 285 (a), (b), and (c), applicant shall not substitute any fuels, coatings, nor raw materials for those described in the application and allowed by this permit, nor make changes to the process or process equipment described in the application, without prior notification to and approval by the Air Quality Division. [R 336.1201(1)]
- 14. The Department may require the applicant to conduct acceptable performance tests, at the applicant's expense, in accordance with R 336.2001 and R 336.2003, under any of the conditions listed in R 336.2001. [R 336.2001]

Material Usage Limits

2. Applicant shall not burn any waste in EUCREMATORY other than pathological waste as defined in 40 CFR Part 60.51c. Pathological waste is waste material consisting of only human or animal remains, anatomical parts, and/or tissue, the bags/containers used to collect and transport the waste material, and animal bedding. [40 CFR Part 60, Subpart Ec (60.50c (b))]

Process/Operational Limits

- 3. The applicant shall not operate EUCREMATORY unless a minimum temperature of 1600 degrees Fahrenheit and a minimum retention time of 0.75 seconds in the secondary combustion chamber is maintained. For compliance demonstration purposes, a temperature gauge on the secondary combustion chamber must be installed and operating properly [R 336.1301 and R 36.1910]
- 4. Proper operation and adequate maintenance of EUCREMATORY to control emissions is required. A list of recommended operating and maintenance procedures is enclosed. [R 336.1301 and R 336.1910]

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Recordkeeping/Reporting/Notification

- 5. Records of the temperature in the secondary combustion chamber during operation shall be kept on file for a period of at least five years and made available to the Air Quality Division upon request. **[R 336.1301 and R 336.1910]**
- 6. The applicant shall keep records on a calendar quarter basis of the periods of time when pathological waste is burned in EUCREMATORY. The records shall be kept on file for a period of five years and made available to the Air Quality Division upon request. **[40 CFR Part 60, Subpart Ec (60.50c (b))]**

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INCINERATOR OPERATION GUIDELINES

- 1. Designate a trained operator for your unit and make that person responsible for compliance with the air pollution control requirements.
- 2. Grates should be cleaned before each day's operation (more often if necessary), and the ashes disposed of properly.
- 3. <u>Preheat</u> the unit with the burners (not with waste) for at least 15 minutes.
- 4. Do not overload the incinerator. Stay within the given loading rates, and follow the manufacturer's instructions.
- 5. Schedule charges to minimize opening the charging door as infrequently as possible. Opening the charging door lets cold air in and quenches the fire causing smoke.
- 6. Burn only the type of wastes that your incinerator has been approved to burn. Follow the manufacturer's instructions to maximize the efficiency of the unit, and to properly burn the waste(s).
- 7. Keep the combustion air adjusted according to the manufacturer's instructions.
- 8. Observe the stack frequently and adjust your operation as necessary to eliminate smoke and flyash.
- 9. A copy of the manufacturer's manual and this Guideline should be posted near your incinerator.
- 10. Make quarterly inspections to check and service all of the equipment. If you do not have a qualified person available for proper inspections, a service contract with a reputable manufacturer is advisable.

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
