GENERAL CONDITIONS

- 1. The process or process equipment covered by this permit shall not be reconstructed, relocated, or modified, unless a Permit to Install authorizing such action is issued by the Department, except to the extent such action is exempt from the Permit to Install requirements by any applicable rule. (R 336.1201(1))
- 2. If the installation, construction, reconstruction, relocation, or modification of the equipment for which this permit has been approved has not commenced within 18 months, or has been interrupted for 18 months, this permit shall become void unless otherwise authorized by the Department. Furthermore, the permittee or the designated authorized agent shall notify the Department via the Supervisor, Permit Section, Air Quality Division, Michigan Department of Environmental Quality, P.O. Box 30260, Lansing, Michigan 48909-7760, if it is decided not to pursue the installation, construction, reconstruction, relocation, or modification of the equipment allowed by this Permit to Install. (R 336.1201(4))
- 3. If this Permit to Install is issued for a process or process equipment located at a stationary source that is not subject to the Renewable Operating Permit program requirements pursuant to R 336.1210, operation of the process or process equipment is allowed by this permit if the equipment performs in accordance with the terms and conditions of this Permit to Install. (R 336.1201(6)(b))
- 4. The Department may, after notice and opportunity for a hearing, revoke this Permit to Install if evidence indicates the process or process equipment is not performing in accordance with the terms and conditions of this permit or is violating the Department's rules or the Clean Air Act. (R 336.1201(8), Section 5510 of Act 451, PA 1994)
- 5. The terms and conditions of this Permit to Install shall apply to any person or legal entity that now or hereafter owns or operates the process or process equipment at the location authorized by this Permit to Install. If the new owner or operator submits a written request to the Department pursuant to R 336.1219 and the Department approves the request, this permit will be amended to reflect the change of ownership or operational control. The request must include all of the information required by subrules (1)(a), (b), and (c) of R 336.1219 and shall be sent to the District Supervisor, Air Quality Division, Michigan Department of Environmental Quality. (R 336.1219)
- 6. Operation of this equipment shall not result in the emission of an air contaminant which causes injurious effects to human health or safety, animal life, plant life of significant economic value, or property, or which causes unreasonable interference with the comfortable enjoyment of life and property. (R 336.1901)
- 7. The permittee shall provide notice of an abnormal condition, start-up, shutdown, or malfunction that results in emissions of a hazardous or toxic air pollutant which continue for more than one hour in excess of any applicable standard or limitation, or emissions of any air contaminant continuing for more than two hours in excess of an applicable standard or limitation, as required in Rule 912, to the Department. The notice shall be provided not later than two business days after start-up, shutdown, or discovery of the abnormal condition or malfunction. Written reports, if required, must be filed with the Department within 10 days after the start-up or shutdown occurred, within 10 days after the abnormal conditions or malfunction has been corrected, or within 30 days of discovery of the abnormal condition or malfunction, whichever is first. The written reports shall include all of the information required in Rule 912(5). (R 336.1912)
- 8. Approval of this permit does not exempt the permittee from complying with any future applicable requirements which may be promulgated under Part 55 of 1994 PA 451, as amended or the Federal Clean Air Act.
- Approval of this permit does not obviate the necessity of obtaining such permits or approvals from other units of government as required by law.
- 10. Operation of this equipment may be subject to other requirements of Part 55 of 1994 PA 451, as amended and the rules promulgated thereunder.

- 11. Except as provided in subrules (2) and (3) or unless the special conditions of the Permit to Install include an alternate opacity limit established pursuant to subrule (4) of R 336.1301, the permittee shall not cause or permit to be discharged into the outer air from a process or process equipment a visible emission of density greater than the most stringent of the following. The grading of visible emissions shall be determined in accordance with R 336.1303. (R 336.1301)
 - a) A six-minute average of 20 percent opacity, except for one six-minute average per hour of not more than 27 percent opacity.
 - b) A visible emission limit specified by an applicable federal new source performance standard.
 - c) A visible emission limit specified as a condition of this Permit to Install.
- 12. Collected air contaminants shall be removed as necessary to maintain the equipment at the required operating efficiency. The collection and disposal of air contaminants shall be performed in a manner so as to minimize the introduction of contaminants to the outer air. Transport of collected air contaminants in Priority I and II areas requires the use of material handling methods specified in R 336.1370(2). (R 336.1370)
- 13. The Department may require the permittee to conduct acceptable performance tests, at the permittee's expense, in accordance with R 336.2001 and R 336.2003, under any of the conditions listed in R 336.2001. (R 336.2001)

1. The permittee shall burn only diesel fuel in EUEMERGEN4 with the maximum sulfur content of 15 ppm (0.0015 percent) by weight. (R 336.1205(1)(a) and (3))

III. PROCESS/OPERATIONAL RESTRICTIONS

1. The permittee shall not operate EUEMERGEN4 for more than 500 hours per year on a 12-month rolling time period basis as determined at the end of each calendar month. The 500 hours includes the hours for the purpose of necessary maintenance checks and readiness testing. (R 336.1205(1)(a) and (3), R 336.1225, R 336.1702(a), 40 CFR 52.21 (c) and (d))

IV. DESIGN/EQUIPMENT PARAMETERS

- 1. The permittee shall equip and maintain EUEMERGEN4 with a non-resettable hours meter to track the operating hours. (R 336.1205(1)(a) and (3), R 336.1225, R 336.1702(a), 40 CFR 52.21 (c) and (d))
- 2. The maximum rated power output of EUEMERGEN4 shall not exceed 2,922 HP, based on documentation from the equipment manufacturer. (R 336.1205(1)(a) and (3), R 336.1225)

V. TESTING/SAMPLING

Records shall be maintained on file for a period of five years. (R 336.1201(3))

1. Upon request by the AQD District Supervisor, the permittee shall verify NOx emission factors used to calculate emissions from EUEMERGEN4, by testing at owner's expense, in accordance with Department requirements. If a test has been conducted, any resulting increase in an emission factor shall be implemented to calculate NO_x. No less than 60 days prior to testing, the permittee shall submit a complete test plan to the AQD. The AQD must approve the final plan prior to testing. Verification of emission rates includes the submittal of a complete report of the test results to the AQD within 60 days following the last date of the test. (R 336.1205, R 336.2001, R 336.2003, R 336.2004)

VI. MONITORING/RECORDKEEPING

Records shall be maintained on file for a period of five years. (R 336.1201(3))

- 1. The permittee shall monitor and record the total hours of operation for EUEMERGEN4, on a monthly and 12-month rolling time period basis, in a manner acceptable to the District Supervisor, Air Quality Division. The permittee shall keep all records on file at the facility and make them available to the Department upon request. (R 336.1205(1)(a) and (3))
- 2. The permittee shall keep, in a satisfactory manner, fuel supplier certification records or fuel sample test data, for each delivery of diesel fuel oil used in EUEMERGEN4. The certification or test data shall include the name of the oil supplier or laboratory, and the sulfur content. The permittee shall keep all records on file at the facility and make them available to the Department upon request. (R 336.1205(1)(a) and (3))
- 3. The permittee shall keep, in a satisfactory manner, records of the manufacturer's Exhaust Emission Data Sheet containing emission factors for EUEMERGEN4. The permittee shall keep all records on file at the facility and make them available to the Department upon request. (R 336.1205(1)(a) and (3), 40 CFR 52.21 (c) and (d))

II. MATERIAL LIMITS

1. The permittee shall burn only diesel fuel in EUEMERGEN5 with the maximum sulfur content of 15 ppm (0.0015 percent) by weight, and a minimum Cetane index of 40 or a maximum aromatic content of 35 volume percent. (R 336.1205(1)(a) and (3), 40 CFR 60.4207, 40 CFR 80.510(b))

III. PROCESS/OPERATIONAL RESTRICTIONS

- 1. The permittee shall not operate EUEMERGEN5 for more than 500 hours per year on a 12-month rolling time period basis as determined at the end of each calendar month. The 500 hours includes the hours for the purpose of necessary maintenance checks and readiness testing as described in SC III.2. (R 336.1205(1)(a) and (3), R 336.1225, R 336.1702(a), 40 CFR 52.21 (c) and (d))
- 2. The permittee may operate EUEMERGEN5 for no more than 100 hours per calendar year for the purpose of necessary maintenance checks and readiness testing, provided that the tests are recommended by Federal, State, or local government, the manufacturer, the vendor, the regional transmission organization or equivalent balancing authority and transmission operator, or the insurance company associated with the engine. The permittee may petition the Department for approval of additional hours to be used for maintenance checks and readiness testing. A petition is not required if the owner or operator maintains records indicating that Federal, State, or local standards require maintenance and testing of emergency internal combustion engines beyond 100 hours per calendar year. EUEMERGEN5 may operate up to 50 hours per calendar year in non-emergency situations, but those 50 hours are counted towards the 100 hours per calendar year provided for maintenance and testing. Except as provided in 40 CFR 60.4211(f)(3)(i), the 50 hours per calendar year for non-emergency situations cannot be used for peak shaving or non-emergency demand response, or to generate income for the permittee to supply non-emergency power as part of a financial arrangement with another entity. (40 CFR 60.4211(f))
- 3. If the permittee purchased a certified engine, according to procedures specified in 40 CFR Part 60 Subpart IIII, for the same model year and maximum engine power, the permittee shall meet the following requirements for EUEMERGEN5:
 - a. Operate and maintain the certified engine and control device according to the manufacturer's emission-related written instructions;
 - b. Change only those emission-related settings that are permitted by the manufacturer; and
 - c. Meet the requirements as specified in 40 CFR 89, 94, and/or 1068, as they apply to you.

If you do not operate and maintain the certified engine and control device according to the manufacturer's emission-related written instructions, the engine may be considered a non-certified engine. (40 CFR 60.4211(a) and (b))

4. If the permittee purchased a non-certified engine or a certified engine operating in a non-certified manner, the permittee shall keep a maintenance plan for EUEMERGEN5 and shall, to the extent practicable, maintain and operate the engine in a manner consistent with good air pollution control practice for minimizing emissions. (40 CFR 60.4211(g)(3))

IV. DESIGN/EQUIPMENT PARAMETERS

- 1. The permittee shall equip and maintain EUEMERGEN5 with a non-resettable hours meter to track the operating hours. (R 336.1205(1)(a) and (3), R 336.1225, 40 CFR 60.4209)
- 2. The maximum rated power output of EUEMERGEN5 shall not exceed 2,922 HP, based on documentation from the equipment manufacturer. (R 336.1205(1)(a) and (3), R 336.1225, 40 CFR 60.4202)

V. TESTING/SAMPLING

Records shall be maintained on file for a period of five years. (R 336.1201(3))

- 1. If the engine is not installed, configured, operated, and maintained according to the manufacturer's emission-related written instructions, or the permittee changes emission-related settings in a way that is not permitted by the manufacturer, the permittee must demonstrate compliance as follows:
 - a. Conduct an initial performance test to demonstrate compliance with the applicable emission standards within 1 year of startup, or within 1 year after an engine and control device is no longer installed, configured, operated, and maintained in accordance with the manufacturer's emission-related written instructions, or within 1 year after you change emission-related settings in a way that is not permitted by the manufacturer.
 - b. If a performance test is required, the performance tests shall be conducted according to 40 CFR 60.4212.
 - c. Conduct subsequent performance testing every 8,760 hours of engine operation or every 3 years, whichever comes first, thereafter to demonstrate compliance with the applicable emission standards.

No less than 30 days prior to testing, a complete test plan shall be submitted to the AQD. Verification of emission rates includes the submittal of a complete report of the test results to the AQD within 60 days following the last date of the test. (40 CFR 60.4211(g)(3), 40 CFR 60.4212)

VI. MONITORING/RECORDKEEPING

Records shall be maintained on file for a period of five years. (R 336.1201(3))

- 1. The permittee shall keep, in a satisfactory manner, the following records for EUEMERGEN5:
 - a. For each certified engine: The permittee shall keep records of the manufacturer certification documentation.
 - b. For each uncertified engine: The permittee shall keep records of testing required in SC V.1.

The permittee shall keep all records on file and make them available to the Department upon request. (40 CFR 60.4211)

- 2. The permittee shall keep, in a satisfactory manner, the following records of maintenance activity for each engine in EUEMERGEN5:
 - a. For each certified engine: The permittee shall keep records of the manufacturer's emission-related written instructions, and records demonstrating that the engine has been maintained according to those instructions, as specified in SC III.3.
 - b. For each uncertified engine: The permittee shall keep records of a maintenance plan, as required by SC III.4, and maintenance activities.

The permittee shall keep all records on file and make them available to the Department upon request. (40 CFR 60.4211)

- 3. The permittee shall monitor and record the total hours of operation and the hours of operation during non-emergencies for EUEMERGEN5, on a monthly basis, 12-month rolling time period basis, and calendar year basis, in a manner acceptable to the District Supervisor, Air Quality Division. The permittee shall document how many hours are spent for emergency operation of EUEMERGEN5, including what classified the operation as emergency. (R 336.1205(1)(a) and (3), 40 CFR 60.4211, 40 CFR 60.4214)
- 4. The permittee shall keep, in a satisfactory manner, fuel supplier certification records or fuel sample test data, for each delivery of diesel fuel oil used in EUEMERGEN5, demonstrating that the fuel meets the requirement of 40 CFR 80.510(b). The certification or test data shall include the name of the oil supplier or laboratory, the sulfur content, and cetane index or aromatic content of the fuel oil. (R 336.1205(1)(a) and (3), 40 CFR 60.4207, 40 CFR 80.510(b))

VII. REPORTING

1. The permittee shall submit a notification specifying whether EUEMERGEN5 will be operated in a certified or a non-certified manner to the AQD District Supervisor, in writing, within 30 days following the issuance of this permit and within 30 days of switching the manner of operation. (40 CFR Part 60 Subpart IIII)

Each engine in FGNESHAPZZZZ may operate up to 50 hours per calendar year in non-emergency situations, but those 50 hours are counted towards the 100 hours per calendar year provided for maintenance and testing. The 50 hours per calendar year for non-emergency situations cannot be used for peak shaving or non-emergency demand response, or to generate income for the permittee to supply non-emergency power as part of a financial arrangement with another entity. (40 CFR 63.6640(f))

VI. MONITORING/RECORDKEEPING

 The permittee shall monitor and record the total hours of operation and the hours of operation during nonemergencies for each engine in FGNESHAPZZZZ, on a monthly and calendar year basis, in a manner acceptable to the District Supervisor, Air Quality Division. The permittee shall document how many hours are spent for emergency operation for each engine, including what classified the operation as emergency. (40 CFR 63.6640(f))

VII. REPORTING

- 1. The permittee shall submit all applicable notifications specified in 40 CFR 63.7(b) and (c), 63.8 (e), (f)(4), and (f)(6), and 63.9(b) through (e), (g), and (h) by the dates specified. (40 CFR 63.6645(a)(3) and (f))
- 2. The permittee shall submit the following notifications to the Department within 120 days of becoming subject to the relevant standard, in accordance with 40 CFR 63.9(b)(2):
 - a) The name and address of the owner or operator;
 - b) The address (i.e., physical location) of the affected source;
 - c) An identification of the relevant standard, or other requirement, that is the basis of the notification and the source's compliance date;
 - d) A brief description of the nature, size, design, and method of operation of the source and an identification of the types of emission points within the affected source subject to the relevant standard and types of hazardous air pollutants emitted; and
 - e) A statement of whether the affected source is a major source or an area source.
