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GENERAL CONDITIONS

- 1. The process or process equipment covered by this permit shall not be reconstructed, relocated, or modified, unless a Permit to Install authorizing such action is issued by the Department, except to the extent such action is exempt from the Permit to Install requirements by any applicable rule. (R 336.1201(1))
- 2. If the installation, construction, reconstruction, relocation, or modification of the equipment for which this permit has been approved has not commenced within 18 months, or has been interrupted for 18 months, this permit shall become void unless otherwise authorized by the Department. Furthermore, the permittee or the designated authorized agent shall notify the Department via the Supervisor, Permit Section, Air Quality Division, Michigan Department of Environment, Great Lakes, and Energy, P.O. Box 30260, Lansing, Michigan 48909-7760, if it is decided not to pursue the installation, construction, reconstruction, relocation, or modification of the equipment allowed by this Permit to Install. (R 336.1201(4))
- 3. If this Permit to Install is issued for a process or process equipment located at a stationary source that is not subject to the Renewable Operating Permit program requirements pursuant to Rule 210 (R 336.1210), operation of the process or process equipment is allowed by this permit if the equipment performs in accordance with the terms and conditions of this Permit to Install. (R 336.1201(6)(b))
- 4. The Department may, after notice and opportunity for a hearing, revoke this Permit to Install if evidence indicates the process or process equipment is not performing in accordance with the terms and conditions of this permit or is violating the Department's rules or the Clean Air Act. (R 336.1201(8), Section 5510 of Act 451, PA 1994)
- 5. The terms and conditions of this Permit to Install shall apply to any person or legal entity that now or hereafter owns or operates the process or process equipment at the location authorized by this Permit to Install. If the new owner or operator submits a written request to the Department pursuant to Rule 219 and the Department approves the request, this permit will be amended to reflect the change of ownership or operational control. The request must include all of the information required by subrules (1)(a), (b), and (c) of Rule 219 and shall be sent to the District Supervisor, Air Quality Division, Michigan Department of Environment, Great Lakes, and Energy. (R 336.1219)
- 6. Operation of this equipment shall not result in the emission of an air contaminant which causes injurious effects to human health or safety, animal life, plant life of significant economic value, or property, or which causes unreasonable interference with the comfortable enjoyment of life and property. (R 336.1901)
- 7. The permittee shall provide notice of an abnormal condition, start-up, shutdown, or malfunction that results in emissions of a hazardous or toxic air pollutant which continue for more than one hour in excess of any applicable standard or limitation, or emissions of any air contaminant continuing for more than two hours in excess of an applicable standard or limitation, as required in Rule 912, to the Department. The notice shall be provided not later than two business days after start-up, shutdown, or discovery of the abnormal condition or malfunction. Written reports, if required, must be filed with the Department within 10 days after the start-up or shutdown occurred, within 10 days after the abnormal conditions or malfunction has been corrected, or within 30 days of discovery of the abnormal condition or malfunction, whichever is first. The written reports shall include all of the information required in Rule 912(5). (R 336.1912)
- 8. Approval of this permit does not exempt the permittee from complying with any future applicable requirements which may be promulgated under Part 55 of 1994 PA 451, as amended or the Federal Clean Air Act.
- 9. Approval of this permit does not obviate the necessity of obtaining such permits or approvals from other units of government as required by law.
- Operation of this equipment may be subject to other requirements of Part 55 of 1994 PA 451, as amended and the rules promulgated thereunder.

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- 11. Except as provided in subrules (2) and (3) or unless the special conditions of the Permit to Install include an alternate opacity limit established pursuant to subrule (4) of Rule 301, the permittee shall not cause or permit to be discharged into the outer air from a process or process equipment a visible emission of density greater than the most stringent of the following. The grading of visible emissions shall be determined in accordance with Rule 303 (R 336.1303). (R 336.1301)
 - a) A six-minute average of 20 percent opacity, except for one six-minute average per hour of not more than 27 percent opacity.
 - b) A visible emission limit specified by an applicable federal new source performance standard.
 - c) A visible emission limit specified as a condition of this Permit to Install.
- 12. Collected air contaminants shall be removed as necessary to maintain the equipment at the required operating efficiency. The collection and disposal of air contaminants shall be performed in a manner so as to minimize the introduction of contaminants to the outer air. Transport of collected air contaminants in Priority I and II areas requires the use of material handling methods specified in Rule 370(2). (R 336.1370)
- 13. The Department may require the permittee to conduct acceptable performance tests, at the permittee's expense, in accordance with Rule 1001 and Rule 1003, under any of the conditions listed in Rule 1001. (R 336.2001)

II. MATERIAL LIMIT(S)

NA

III. PROCESS/OPERATIONAL RESTRICTION(S)

- 1. Within 30 calendar days of the date of permit approval, the permittee shall submit to the AQD District Supervisor, an approvable operation and maintenance plan. The plan shall contain all information required by 40 CFR 63.342(f)(3)(i), which includes the following: (R 336.1910, 40 CFR Part 63 Subparts A & N)
 - a) Operation and maintenance criteria for FGCHROME, add-on control device(s), and for the process and control device(s) monitoring equipment as well as a standardized checklist to document the operation and maintenance of the equipment;
 - b) The work practice standards for the add-on control device(s) and monitoring equipment;
 - c) Procedures to be followed to ensure that equipment or process malfunctions due to poor maintenance or other preventable conditions do not occur;
 - d) A systematic procedure for identifying process equipment, add-on control device(s) and monitoring equipment malfunctions and for implementing corrective actions to address such malfunctions; and
 - e) The plan shall include housekeeping practices as specified in 40 CFR 63.342(f)(3)(i)(F), Table 2, as applicable to FGCHROME.
- 2. The total rectifier output for all three rectifiers in EUPLATE combined shall not exceed 245 amp-hr/hr on an hourly average. (40 CFR Part 63 Subparts A & N)

IV. DESIGN/EQUIPMENT PARAMETER(S)

- 1. The permittee shall not operate FGCHROME unless the CMP system is installed, maintained, and operated in a satisfactory manner. **(40 CFR Part 63 Subparts A & N)**
- 2. The permittee shall equip and maintain the CMP system with a differential pressure monitoring device. (R 336.1910, 40 CFR 63.343(c))

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3. The permittee shall equip and maintain each rectifier in EUPLATE with a device to monitor and record the rectifier output in amp-hr and the operational (plating) hours. (40 CFR Part 63 Subparts A & N)

V. TESTING/SAMPLING

Records shall be maintained on file for a period of five years. (R 336.1201(3))

1. Upon request by the AQD District Supervisor, the permittee shall verify total chromium emission rates from FGCHROME, by testing at owner's expense, in accordance with 40 CFR Part 63 Subparts A and N. The permittee shall notify the AQD District Supervisor in writing of the intention to conduct a performance test, at least 60 calendar days before the test is scheduled to begin, in accordance with 40 CFR 63.347(d). Stack testing procedures and the location of stack testing ports shall be in accordance with the applicable federal Reference Methods, 40 CFR Part 63 Appendix A. No less than 60 days prior to testing, the permittee shall submit a complete test plan to the AQD. The AQD must approve the final plan prior to testing. Verification of emission rates includes the submittal of a complete report of the test results to the AQD within 90 days following the last date of the test. (R 336.2001, R 336.2002, R 336.2003, 40 CFR Part 63 Subparts A & N)

VI. MONITORING/RECORDKEEPING

Records shall be maintained on file for a period of five years. (R 336.1201(3))

- The permittee shall complete all required calculations in a format acceptable to the AQD District Supervisor and make them available by the last day of the calendar month, for the previous calendar month, unless otherwise specified in any recordkeeping, reporting or notification special condition. (40 CFR Part 63 Subparts A & N)
- 2. The permittee shall perform inspections of the CMP system portion of FGCHROME as follows: (R 336.1910, 40 CFR Part 63.342(f) and 63.343(c)(1)or(3))
 - a) Determine pressure drop across the CMP system on a daily basis. If the pressure drop across the control varies by more than ±2 inch of water gauge, from the pressure drop determined during compliance testing, the permittee shall document the variation, and review the operation and maintenance procedures. The permittee shall document any corrective action.
 - b) Visually inspect the CMP system, on a quarterly basis, to ensure there is proper drainage, no chromic acid build up on the pads, and no evidence of chemical attack on the structural integrity of the control device.
 - c) Visually inspect the back portion of the mesh pad closest to the fan, on a quarterly basis, to ensure there is no breakthrough of chromic acid mist.
 - d) Visually inspect ductwork from tanks to the CMP system, on a quarterly basis, to ensure there are no leaks.
 - e) Perform wash-down of CMPs in accordance with manufacturer's recommendations.
- 3. The permittee shall monitor emissions and operating and maintenance information in accordance with the National Emission Standards for Hazardous Air Pollutants as specified in 40 CFR Part 63 Subparts A and N. The permittee shall keep records of all source emissions and operating and maintenance information on file at the facility and make them available to the Department upon request. (40 CFR Part 63 Subparts A & N)
- 4. The permittee shall maintain records of inspections required to comply with applicable work practice standards of 40 CFR 63.342(f). Each inspection record shall identify the device inspected, the date, approximate time of inspection, and a brief description of the working condition of the device during the inspection. The permittee shall also record any actions taken to correct the deficiencies found during the inspection. The permittee shall keep all records on file and make them available to the Department upon request. (R 336.1910, 40 CFR Part 63 Subparts A & N)
- 5. The permittee shall monitor and record, in a satisfactory manner, the amp-hours for each rectifier in EUPLATE on a continuous basis. The permittee shall keep all records on file and make them available to the Department upon request. (40 CFR Part 63 Subparts A & N)
- 6. The permittee shall record, in a satisfactory manner, the operational (plating) hours for each rectifier in EUPLATE for each batch processed. The permittee shall keep all records on file and make them available to the Department upon request. (40 CFR Part 63 Subparts A & N)

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7. The permittee shall calculate and record the hourly average total rectifier output for EUPLATE in amp-hr/hr. The permittee shall keep all records on file and make them available to the Department upon request. The calculations shall be performed using a method approved by the District Supervisor. (40 CFR Part 63 Subparts A & N)

VII. REPORTING

- 1. Within 30 days after completion of the installation, construction, reconstruction, relocation, or modification authorized by this Permit to Install, the permittee or the authorized agent pursuant to Rule 204, shall notify the AQD District Supervisor, in writing, of the completion of the activity. Completion of the installation, construction, reconstruction, relocation, or modification is considered to occur not later than commencement of trial operation of FGCHROME. (R 336.1201(7)(a))
- 2. Permittee shall submit the following notifications to the Department in accordance with 40 CFR Part 63.347: (40 CFR Part 63 Subparts A & N)
 - a) A notification of the date when construction was commenced, submitted no later than 30 calendar days after such date.
 - b) A notification of the actual date of startup of the source, submitted within 30 calendar days after such date.
- 3. Permittee shall prepare an ongoing compliance status report in accordance with 40 CFR 63.347(h)(1). (40 CFR Part 63 Subparts A & N)

VIII. STACK/VENT RESTRICTION(S)

The exhaust gases from the stacks listed in the table below shall be discharged unobstructed vertically upwards to the ambient air unless otherwise noted:

IX. OTHER REQUIREMENT(S)
